CEO's Message


Hello Everyone, and welcome back to the March edition of our Tiwi News Letter.

Marni Clark, our new Receptionist at our front desk in Darwin, is the daughter of Shawn Clark who many will remember was based at the Garden Point Police Station some years' back.



Also during this year we hope to finalize and present to all clans the updated Register of Traditional Owners. This will initiate many discussions before tabling and endorsement of the Land Council itself.

Over the past year, TLC has worked closely with the National Indigenous Australians Agency [NIAA] and relevant Government Departments to seek investment into our Outstations. Scheduled during the coming Dry Season is completion of upgrades to solar installations; solar batteries and Water Tanks etc. We are also pushing for increased maintenance and housing.

I would like to congratulate Tiwi Enterprises on their completion of the pontoon project. This has been a long outstanding and very much needed infrastructure asset for all Tiwi, visitors, guests, and others arriving by ferry. CEO, Tiwi Land Council

Congratulations are also due to our Tiwi Islands Regional Council, [TIRC] for having the Two Car Ferry built and now in operations between Melville and Bathurst Islands. The safety of Land Owners has been an issue for a long time when crossing the Aspley Strait. We thank Custom Works who built the ferry in Darwin, and for the support that has been given by the Northern Territory Government.

These are great outcomes with which to commence our new decade of 2020....May we all strive for continuing and better improvements across the Tiwi Islands.

Congratulations and Achievements Damascena (Brandy) Kerinaiua





Damascena (Brandy) Kerinaiua is the 2nd ever student studying on the Tiwi Islands to achieve not only the NTCET, but complete additional studies to gain an ATAR score. The Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking (ATAR) is a national ranking system that enables students direct access to university and other tertiary institutions in much the same way that the AFL draft gives players access to the AFL competition. Students must complete extra subjects than what is required to gain the NTCET and so qualifying for such a ranking is a massive achievement!

Brandy was recognised for her outstanding achievements earlier in February at the Northern Territory Board of Studies awards, which were hosted at Parliament House. Brandy received the Kami Sceney Remote Aboriginal Excellence and Leadership award for her outstanding academic achievements and proving that quality educational outcomes can be achieved whilst staying connected to family and culture on the Tiwi Islands.

New training and employment

to improve kids' ear and hearing health

Does your child have ear problems or trouble hearing? Hearing for Learning training has begun in Wurrumiyanga with 13 community members doing 6 weeks of training to become ear experts.

From the group of Trainees, 2 people will be employed part time by the clinic as Ear Health Facilitators working with families and the schools to help kids who might not be hearing well.

Ear disease is a big problem in Northern Territory communities and can affect children for the rest of their life if left untreated. There is some evidence that shows a lot of people in jail have hearing loss.

The Menzies School of Health Research received approval for the Initiative at the Tiwi Land Council meeting on 26 February in Wurrumiyanga. It aims to show that training people on country with knowledge of their people, language and culture is the best approach, rather than fly-in fly-out services.

This followed approval of the Initiative by the three Tiwi Local Authorities and Tiwi Islands Regional Council in 2019.

The Initiative has begun with a pilot phase in Wurrumiyanga and Kalkaringi and training began on 3 February. A Community Reference Group will be established to help guide the Initiative in each community, and the Wurrumiyanga group met 26 February to discuss progress.



Pirlangimpi and Milikapiti are also part of the Initiative which will continue until the end of 2022. Training will be delivered over 3 months beginning at six-monthly intervals in 20 communities across the Northern Territory – we don't know yet when training will start in the other Tiwi communities, but we will keep you updated. Gunbalanya and Katherine are next.

The Initiative is funded by lead philanthropic supporter The Balnaves Foundation, and the Australian and Northern Territory governments.

Tikalaru meeting with Daniel Tucker

The Tikalaru Clan have been looking at the possibilities in relation to sand mining on their country over the last twelve months or so. Whilst we are still in the preliminary stages and a long way from any sand being sold, we were very lucky to be able to hear the entrepreneurial story of Daniel Tucker, a Wongatha man from the Eastern Goldfields regions of Western Australia. Daniel was at Wurrumiyanga for the opening of the newly constructed Visitors Centre and Pontoons. He is the founding Managing Director of Carey MC, the contractor who built the pontoon.

Daniel graciously gave up his time to speak of his business experiences with the Tikalaru Clan. He shared his story of working his way up from his first job of mopping floors and cleaning windows, to getting the opportunity to train as an engine driver, to starting his own business, Carey, in 1995. Today Carey has 3 arms – Civil, Mining and Training – and has the vision to create 'new horizons for Indigenous people through business'. He wished the Tikalaru Clan all the best, encouraging them to think big, but also cautioning them to have a good business model in place.



Robert Tipungwuti

Born on Bathurst Island 13th July 1939. He has had a distinguished career as Commissioner of the Aboriginal Development Commission through the 1980's and held other senior leadership positions in Aboriginal Affairs. He was widely credited with the establishment of the Ranku Outstation on Bathurst Island. During the 1980's and 1990's Mr. Tipungwuti was the President at Milikapiti and secured the Tiwi strength of this vital Township on Melville Island.

His determination and leadership have been a driving force behind economic development on the Tiwi Islands for many years.

He was also a member of the Tiwi Education Board establishing the Tiwi College at Pickataramoor on Melville Island in association with government and industry partners.

Mr. Tipungwuti was a ceremonial leader with strength and determination and was committed to the service of his people, and to better their education, health and participation as a secure people within Australia.

A Memorial Service will be held in Darwin at St Mary's Cathedral on the 5th May.

The Funeral will take place at Ranku on Bathurst Island on the 7th May 2020.

He was member of the NT Government Indigenous Reference Group.

Mr. Tipungwuti was a Board member of the Aboriginal Areas Protection Authority from 2006 to 2015 and was an informed voice due to his seniority and extensive official political background. Mr. Tipungwuti was a strong and respected communicator able to build relationships within any community.

Mr. Tipungwuti was also a very active sportsman, having played Aussie Rules alongside Senator Pat Dodson for the St. Mary's Club. His legacy of sports is still carried out on the Islands.

The Members and staff of Tiwi Land Council

had the honour of having Mr. Tipungwuti officially declare open the office in Darwin on the 10th of May 2019 - performing the ribbon cutting ceremony while the ribbon was held by the former Senator Nigel Scullion and Senior leader of the Tiwi's Bernard Tipiloura.

This marked the last official performance


of Mr. Tipungwuti who was instrumental in forming the Tiwi Land Council.

Among the galaxy of Tiwi stars Mr. Tipungwuti - In Memoriam



Among the galaxy of Tiwi stars, few have ever shone so bright or for so long as has Robert Tipungwuti. Charismatic, handsome, full of humour, relentless in his push for 'Tiwi jobs on Tiwi land' this pioneer of our economy leaves shoes difficult to fill. Family, those who worked with him, the many thousands touched and enchanted by his charm; - we all mourn the passing of a truly remarkable man.

His determination and skills of diplomacy

were internationally recognised as Head of the ADC through the 1980's in Canberra and at Embassies and Trade Missions throughout Europe and USA. Always gracious, consistently joyful, he was able to apply his inborn traditional Tiwi understanding of "respect" for the benefit of Australian trade and connections around the world. A diplomat from America, who later visited Melville Island noted that "He could charm the socks off anyone."






Among the galaxy of stars Mr. Tipungwuti - In Memoriam

At home his founding of the Wurankuwu Community is legendary. Overcoming all planning and development obstacles he merely stated, "My Father wanted that I make a place for my people. What else could I do?" His talents were formidable when applied for the benefit of his people. They continued through his years as Chairman of our Land Council overseeing infrastructure and development projects, and steering approvals through a network of barriers in Canberra and Darwin.

His was a life surrounded by "getting things done." His words resonate to this day, "If you don't try you don't get." He tried so hard and accomplished so much through a dignified life of service to his people and to Australia. A unique man with skills and attributes that we are unlikely to encounter in many lifetimes. His sickness in recent years has not diminished the pain for family at his passing. We hold you all in sympathy and respect; but more with gratitude for the life and work of a remarkable Tiwi whose presence lit up our own lives, and the lives of so many others. 
What's Happening at Port Melville?

On the 28th of November bulk carrier 'MV Efficiency OL' departed the Port loaded with approximately 24,000 tonnes of Tiwi pine logs for export. This is the fourth shipment of logs and once again loading operations were conducted in an efficient and safe manner which reflects on the professionalism of all involved.

On the 14th of February the fuel tanker 'PVT Saturn' berthed at the Port to deliver the latest parcel of fuel to our tank farm for marine and land bunkering. Again, the Port team carried out operations in a safe, professional and efficient manner assisted by Argonaut Marine Group providing pilotage and CTB providing towage.



This operation was also the first occasion that Port Melville trainees Hayden Henry-Whiting and Richard Djorlom assisted with the berthing and unberthing of the vessel, fuel offload and tug deckhand duties.



The Port also continues to bunker Commonwealth vessels.


Laressa Munkara: Is the first student in her immediate family to graduate with an NTCET, and is a role model for her younger siblings.
