In 2007 Mr Kerinauia signed as the first indigenous leader in the history of Australia a 99 year lease over a township with the Commonwealth Govern-



WKerinaina - In Memorian



The Father of our Tiwi Economy and a founder of our Land Council, was the first son of Rosie born on Bathurst Island 17 August 1947. His father Jerry was a Mantiyupwi man of strength and culture.

"I thought he was just cheeky at school until I realized he was just so bright. But more than that was his happiness. His great good humour, and always thinking of his people. I love who he was and what he has done for all Tiwi." (Sister Anne 2013).

It was that joyful intelligence that he took to his beloved St. Mary's Football Club who nurtured his skills and the warmth of a magnetic personality. "You could always trust that man. He was a man of his word. That's how he lived his life" (Jack Long 2013).

Five times he made Grand Final, winning in 1967 and again in 1972; Best and Fairest in the entire competition in 1971 with interstate and South Adelaide representation through the 1960's.



"He was fast, exciting and brilliant himself, but what I remember as Premiership coach was that he did these things for the team. He was a real Team Man." (Tony Shaw 2013).

"He brought me back to the Islands to manage the sawmill in the 70's. I think even then he was starting to build a team for the future of our people - Team Tiwi. He was determined we start our own Land Council separate from NLC. We didn't know politics; we just knew that Tiwi means to be strong on our land. That's what he lived for. That's what we believe in." (Cyril Kalippa 2013).

It was a discussion he had with Earl Bathurst and Lord Apsley in 2003 about investment and using land that led to the historic meetings he had with Mal Brough through 2005 and 2006. – "You will need investment for the new wealth of your people to change lives. Your traditions are older than ours but they are the same – respect for each other and for your good managers of land." (Lord Alan Apsley 2003).

Looking after Tiwi environment Looking after Tiwi jobs

It's that time of the year again when Red Goshawk (Erythrotriorchis radiatus) surveys and monitoring are being carried out by Tiwi Plantations Corporation staff. Every August TPC staff undertake a survey for Red Goshawks on Melville Island to try to find as many pairs as we can. This year we have found and started monitoring 8 pairs, 2 of which have not been found before (1 on the Takapramilli Road and the other on the Milikapiti Road). Monitoring of the birds is undertaken at least once a week to determine their breeding success.

Red Goshawk Identification

Colour: Red Goshawks are large reddish, brown coloured birds with thick yellow legs and feet. Not unlike most humans, older birds develop grey feathers on their chest and underbelly.

Nesting Time: Male birds begin building their nests in July, in preparation for the female to lay her eggs in early August. The chicks are usually old enough to leave the nest in late December.

Breeding: Each pair lays 1 - 2 eggs/year, although it is uncommon for 2 young chicks to survive.

Habitat: Red Goshawks live in Tall Open Forests, near a permanent water supply.

Size: Like all raptors (birds of prey) the female is larger than the male. The male is predominantly 45 to 51cm tall while the female is predominantly 58 to 61cm tall.

Nest Description: Nests are built quite high in the tree, usually 15+ meters, in the fork of a horizontal branch. Their nest is the size of a washing basked and is made of large sticks. It is easily distinguishable from other nests as it has a characteristically flat shape. The majority of nests that are monitored are located on the side of a roadway or track.

Tiwi Forestry Environmental Audit

The Tiwi forest is owned by Tiwi people, and the Tiwi Land Council has said that it must be managed to the best environmental standard. The forest currently meets an international standard called ISO 14001, which

means that it has an internationally recognised environmental management system.

The forestry must be accredited every year. This means that every year audits have to be done to see if it is still being run to international standard. If the audit is failed, then the accreditation is taken away. Audits happen twice every year — once by the Tiwi Land Council, who has a qualified environmental auditor on staff, and once by an outside professional.

Tiwi forest has never failed an ISO 14001 audit, which means that it has always been run to an environmentally international standard.

Tiwi Islands Adventures Chef Mick Prior, based at Melville Island Lodge Milikapiti, has been working with Wal Albertson from Milikapiti farm and Plant nursery to supply the lodge with fresh produce.

Guest have enjoyed the locally grown butter nut pumpkin as well as an assortment of other produce including watermelon, cucumber, Pak Choi, coral lettuce, bananas, capsicum and basil.

Wal and his team deliver boxes of produce weekly as well as Mick heading up to the farm to hand pick produce for the lodge guests to enjoy.

Managers' Notes

Your Tiwi Land Council members, past and present, have worked towards the economic development and real employment opportunities for our people over many years as we see that as the best way for our people to live happy and rewarding lives.

The Northern Territory Government also understands that this vision is the best way to break the cycle of welfare dependence and indigenous disadvantage.

Your TLC Managers would like to share some facts with our people regarding discussions with the Northern Territory Government, which have been misrepresented by some media and others.

Your Managers and Trustees met with the Chief Minister, our MLA and some NTG heads of Departments on the 27th of August.

The discussion included ways to maximize economic development and real employment opportunities for all Tiwi people. Leasing of some areas of the Tiwi Islands was discussed as part of this. The Tiwi have proud and successful leasing arrangements with the Commonwealth Government at Wurrumiyanga, Milikapiti and Ranku as well as the lease of the Forestry plantations and Tiwi Islands Adventures now 100% under Tiwi control and ownership. The lease of Port Melville, with the new wharf just days from completion, will create massive business and employment opportunities for all Tiwi.

The Tiwi College is another example of the strength and vision of our leaders, with Mantiyup-wi leasing part of their land at Pikataramoor to the Tiwi Education Board, for the benefit of all Tiwi people.



Managers Tiwi Land Council

Leasing means using land for a purpose. Telstra have leases to make our phones work: Townships have leases to make them work better: Our Stores and Clubs all have leases. Leases are things that can make a purpose work. Gives the Landowners a new LEASE of life, if they want to participate in a purpose.

The meeting with the NTG is simply the first of many meetings to discuss economic development but:

No decisions on leasing with the Northern Territory Government have been made. No Leasing Agreement has been signed.

Before agreeing to any lease arrangements your Tiwi Land Council has a legal and social


responsibility to consult with the relevant landowners. Any major proposal will need to undergo a cost benefit analysis, feasibility study and intensive legal advice to ensure that any proposal is supported by the Land Owners and is of best benefit to our people.

It took forty eight meetings for this process to be concluded for the Township lease at Wurrumiyanga and we will continue to follow this process to meet the satisfaction of our Land Owners and your Tiwi Land Council who represent you.

Your TLC Managers, Trustees and Delegates would like to send our respects to our people who have lost members of our Tiwi family over the past months.

In particular, we have lost one of our greatest leaders in W. Kerinaiua. As noted in these pages, he was an inaugural member of the Tiwi Land Council, past Chairman, terrific footballer and in later life, a great supporter of the Tiwi Bombers, but most important of all, a true Tiwi leader, ALAWURA, of his people throughout the Islands. His vision, passion and commitment to benefit all Tiwi people through developing economic, education and employment opportunities; his strength and his sense of humour will be sorely missed by all who have been touched by him, from the Tiwi Islands to Canberra to England and beyond.

Built a Wharf



Marine & Civil a Western Australian owned and operated company began looking at the Melville Island Wharf Project in late 2010, which was the time I made my first visit to Tiwi. This progressed into concept design engineering for the Port Melville Wharf in early 2011. M&C's involvement with the project then went quiet for a period, but swung back into action in early

2013, at which time M&C was engaged as the Design and Construct Contractor for the floating pontoon structure we now see.

The detailed design of the structure incorporating the 3 of client supplied 110m long x 15m wide concrete pontoons was completed in approximately 12 weeks commencing in late February 2013. During this period the procurement of the 375 tonne of sheet pile for the abutment wall and 620 tonne of 914mm x 20mm WT tubular piles for holding the pontoons in position was also progressed.









Then on Monday 3rd June

the M&C "first landing party" arrived at Melville Island to commence the construction of the new Port Melville wharf.

In the 4 months since then we have:

- Mobilised heavy plant and equipment from all over Australia to the remote Tiwi site to undertake these specialised marine construction works
- Earthworks including the excavation of approximately 25,000m3 of material for the approach pontoon pocket and the abutment wall construction.
- Driven 110m of sheet pile varying from 16m to 8m long
- Installed 800m of purpose built tie-rods
- Driven 30 of 914mm OD piles varying from 16m to 30m into the seabed which equates to approximately 600m of pile in the ground
- Fabrication, completed in Darwin, and installation of 120 tonne of structural steelwork
- Moved the 3 pontoon into position
- Installation of mooring and berthing furniture
- Built a Wharf.



During this time we have also been lucky enough to experience some of the Tiwi culture, and make some special friends, none more so than my mate Cyril. Personally I feel privileged to have been involved with a project which is unique in so many ways including: remoteness of location, pontoons from North America and no Bunnings around the corner. Although the experience has been great we look forward to the end and the completion of a wharf that will hopefully bring good things to our client the Tiwi people. Sean London, Project Manager

Former Vice-Captain & multi Best & Fairest Ross Tungatalum and reigning Club Champion Jason Puruntatameri make up the group.

Joint Coaches Gregory Orsto and Cameron Hotton said that with longterm planning in mind Roy Kantilla, Hector Tipungwuti and Dion Munkara have been appointed to a Young Leaders group with all members mentored by inaugural Captain Thomas Simon and popular veteran John Ross Pilakui.

Message from Member for Arafura

The last few months have been very busy and much has been achieved for the Tiwi people. During June I attended an important meeting with the Bishop regarding education on the Tiwi Islands and the formation of a Tiwi Education Board. This Board is now operating and it will be very important in forwarding the education of especially our Tiwi young people, so that they can become our leaders of the future.

During the Parliamentary sittings I had the pleasure of delivering an important speech on an alcohol management plan for the Tiwi Islands and the support provided by our Traditional Owners for a Mandatory Rehabilitation Centre on the Tiwi Islands. During the Parliamentary sittings I also delivered speeches in the areas dealing with the importance of affordable housing for Territorians, particularly in communities and the importance of a strong economy to provide employment and income for all Tiwi people and people of the Territory.


I also spoke on developments at Port Melville. During July I had the great pleasure of welcoming the vessel bringing the new Port to Port Melville. This Port is a symbol of the future prosperity of all Tiwi. It will allow us to send our forestry products to Asia and to provide much needed training and employment for Tiwi people.

Monday 23 September was also another wonderful day for the Tiwi people as it saw the introduction of the Tiwi Ferry. I would very much like to thank the Chief Minister - Adam Giles and Minister Styles and the Country Liberals Government - for the foresight and confidence they have shown in bringing back our Tiwi Ferry. We lost the ferry and the Tiwi were left stranded by the previous Labor government, due to Labor government mismanagement of previous ferry arrangements.



As a result, key economic enterprises on the Tiwi Islands, - such as Tiwi Tours and Art and Craft centres - were forced to close. This damaged the employment and income of many Tiwi. While the previous Labor government were forced by the Country Liberals, to have a trial run of the Ferry in 2012 – this was far too short - and did not give a clear indication of the viability of the service. We wish to make sure that the trial is done correctly and efficiently and I am sure we can all have confidence in SeaLink to achieve this for us.

This ferry will provide opportunities for increased Tiwi employment and enterprise, in areas such as Tiwi Tours, Art and Craft Galleries, increased visitation with the opportunity to stay overnight in newly constructed accommodation facilities and major events such as the Tiwi Grand Final and the Milimika Festival.



Tiwi College - "Peaceful Picka"

The term has been one of many opportunities for our students here at "Peaceful Picka". Our term has been one of "opportunities". We want our students to experience the rich world outside of the Tiwi Islands and bring back new stories to families. We want our students to shine and feel proud to know how well the Tiwi can participate and compete on the "bigger stage".

This term We have had a boy's trip to Scotch College, Melbourne; a girl's trip to Tintern College, Melbourne; Our Growing Young Women's program once again produced a team that won back - back Ryco Football Championships — playing against schools from all-over the NT; we had some of the best childrens' authors from Australia here from the Indigenous Literacy Foundation holding writing workshops with our students — to improve their creative writing.

Some amazing results were the gold medals that Alex Kantilla and Cecillina Mungatopi earned at the State Athletics Championships – the best in the state!

Cecillina, along with former students Ella Wonaeamirri, Caitlyn Moreen & Darrelyn Puruntatameri were selected in the State u/18 football side at the Australian championships. The NT side won the Championships, Cecillina was the Most Valuable Player for NT and all 4 were selected for the Australian Boomerangs Side! Amazing – we are all so proud of them.

Natasha Bennett our Growing Young Women's Coordinator was also selected as Assistant Coach for the NT State side is now developing legendary status. The Tiwi College girl's side has not been defeated in any game in any competition for close to 3 years! This is a remarkable record.









In week 3 of this term the senior boys and girls travelled to Port Melville at the kind invitation from the people of Ezion Holdings, Marine & Civil and Tiwi Marine Service

Our students were fascinated and asked many, interesting questions about the site, the export of woodchips, future uses of the wharf and of course jobs.

They were genuinely excited about the training that was on offer and the possible jobs available to them. It is safe to say we could see two of our current Senior School cohort working at Port Melville in 2014... and as the song goes – From Little Things, Big Things Grow...

Our curriculum program is running very well at present. Our Senior Girls are working extremely hard and have homework every night. They are working their way through Stage 1 of the Northern Territory senior curriculum. Our senior boys have a VET Pathways program – which again will allow them to complete Stage 1 and stage 2 in the future – but with a focus on VET subjects – to help set them up for jobs in Tiwi Industry.

Morris will benefit from greater exposure to business on the Tiwi Islands and our school benefits from easier pathways to jobs in the Hospitality areas. Of course, all going well the JV will benefit both parties economically if the business runs well.

We hope this will be the beginning of an excellent partnership which will be of benefit to the Tiwi.
